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

Closing the Campaign

When you reflect on the fact that we still need to raise nearly \$775,000 to reach our intended endowment goal, it can feel overwhelming. But when you step back and pick it apart the task appears more reasonable and within reach. If you view the whole (\$775K) as the sum of many smaller parts, it is not nearly as intimidating.

In order to complete the endowment we need:

- 1 corporation/foundation/person to donate \$250K
- 2 people/businesses to donate \$100K each (we already have one of these!)
- 4 people/businesses to donate \$50K each (our initial donation was \$50,000 cash!)
- 10 people/businesses to donate \$10K each (VMGA has raised more than \$16,000 already!)
- 100 people to donate the \$50 for 5 or \$250 each (more than 100 VCE MG volunteers have already done this. What if each of you recruits one other person to pledge \$50 for 5 years? We will quickly reach this portion of our goal!)

That's only 117 more people or businesses! Already more than 200 people, businesses, and VCE MG units and associations have given. We currently have more than 4,000 active VCE MG volunteers. There are numerous businesses and foundations that have missions and goals similar to the VCE MG program. Together we can complete this endowment!

Amherst, Campbell and Lynchburg (Hill City) <http://www.hcmga.com>


Our School Programs in five of Lynchburg's City's Schools have ended for the fall. The programs that were conducted with the 3rd and 4th graders included Bees and their Benefits, Composting, and The Life Cycle of Bulbs. The children were instructed on the equipment and procedure for Bee Keeping and were able to taste different flavors of honey. They built compost bins at their respective schools and learned about compost's benefits to the garden and the environment. They also planted tulips and pansies in their school gardens for enjoyment throughout the winter and spring.

Bedford

Peter Lorenz of the BMG's is working closely with Bedford County (Moneta) Boy Scouts', Lion's and Ruritan's clubs to create the Moneta Recreation Park (MRP). Land has been cleared and as soon as weather permits a few Redbuds and Dogwoods in the nearby woods will be dug up and transplanted to the MRP. To help the Scouts work on their Woodsman Badge, Peter will work closely with the Scouts, teaching them how to plant and care for the trees. Money was donated by BMGs and a concerned citizen to purchase seed trees (crab apple, etc.) to provide plants that birds will feed on.

Our Association won a blue ribbon at the Halifax County Fair in October. The theme, "Water Quality in Halifax County", was well received. A new member, Joan Layman, designed an electronic quiz board with questions, answers concerning water quality and other environmental questions.

"Advanced" Garden Design 401

"I fear I am a little impatient of the school of gardening that encourages the selection of plants merely as artistic furniture, chosen for colour only, like ribbons or embroidery silk. I feel sorry for plants that are obliged to make a struggle in uncongenial situations because their owner wishes all things of those shades of pink, blue or orange to fit in next to the grey or crimson planting."

My Garden in Spring (1914)

As plant clinicians we sometimes forget that our responsibility lies beyond diagnosis and cures for disease and insect problems, save the bay, and water-wise gardening. The lesson for today is to become aware of other landscape design approaches in addition to the *Essential Garden Design Workbook* noted in the Jul-Aug 2007 newsletter. Consider the essentials book as a 101 level training manual. Perhaps the title of this article is a tad hyperbole; however, you will see why it was chosen as you continue reading.

The Self-Sustaining Garden: The Guide to Matrix Planting by Peter Thompson and *A Pattern Garden: The Essential Elements of Garden Making* by Valerie Easton (both books published by Timber Press, 2007) will provide you with additional knowledge and approaches to garden design. If one had to write a précis (a concise abridgment) about each book, Thompson's book discusses how to create strategies where plants are able to take care of themselves once they become established in the landscape (matrix planting). Easton's book provides the means to make a garden feel satisfying by introducing design elements called patterns.

Once you realize the benefits of matrix planting you might wonder why this approach did not occur to you before digging your first hole. A key point that is made abundantly clear is that the harder we work in the garden, the more problems seem to grow and multiply. The traditional way of gardening is to not let plants do much of the hard work for us. Matrix gardening is all about natural gardening and skipping most of the drudgery. This may appear to be an unorthodox way to garden, so before you make up your mind, let me cite a personal analogy. When I went away to school my mother was in charge of my several tanks of tropical fish and plants. She discovered that with less care (read interference), the fish and plants were better off. Does this mean that my mother practiced a form of matrix water gardening or was she lazy? I genuinely believe the former and she had the results to show for it.

Think of the natural behavior of plants as partners in self-sustaining communities wherein they share a space that balances soil resources, opportunities to reproduce and opportunities to eliminate intruders (weeds). In other words, allow plants to grow naturally and maintenance will be reduced in the space provided. Another analogy: wildflowers grow all over with hardly any help from gardeners! This is like an extension of the paradigm right plant-right place (read habitat). Additionally, and you are going to like this, if your garden is planted as a self-governing community, you can forgo a lot of effort that heretofore went into spading and raking and hoeing and digging and forking and on and on. If you follow the matrix approach you will have another timesaving bonus in that you can cut down on fertilizing before and after planting. Also, you will drastically reduce the use of pesticides to control diseases and pests that you know are often harmful activities.

Does this sound like the kind of gardening that you are familiar with? Probably not, but Thompson makes many excellent points by providing examples (case studies) showing detailed applications to support his approach to gardening. Numerous color photos and 14 black and white illustrations contained in 192 pages will help you to follow the matrix approach to gardening.

Turning to *A Pattern Garden*, it is very inspiring and hits an emotional high. Before you are even partway through this book some might wish winter away so that you can yardabout in your townhouse garden, play with containers, think up new ways to treat the woodland, and anything else that makes up your property. It should be noted that Christopher Alexander heavily influenced this book in terms of scale, space, and design. He wrote the ground breaking 1100+-page book called *A Pattern Language* 30 years ago. Alexander advocated the idea "that people should design for themselves their houses, gardens, streets, and communities." Easton, the "new pattern" author, has reinterpreted Alexander's ideas as she focuses on the design aspects of gardening. She does this in 216 pages that are chock full of magnificent color photos. More specifically she discusses 14 essential garden patterns in ten well-organized chapters. Each chapter contains a variety of factors that make design theory easy to comprehend. Below are the essential garden patterns.

There is nothing really new about these garden patterns but this book will provide you with the ideas to enhance your being and your senses in order to sate your garden experience. In other words, you will be able to connect with your garden and its various uses such as relaxing, feeling secure, dining alfresco under a pergola, and whatever other use appeals to you. The takeaway message is that your garden should be a nurturing experience and one that will be full of memorable events both seasonal and personal.

VMGA is please to announce that an EEF Scholarship Committee (hereinafter referred to as the Committee) has been carefully chosen. They are a diverse group and represent five VCE Districts. Nomination criteria have been established and an application form has been developed. All VCE Master Gardeners planning to attend MG College-2008 can be considered for these scholarships; however, preference will be given to Master Gardeners who are members of VMGA.

Every Unit may nominate no more than two candidates. The method of selection is up to each Unit. The Committee requires no explanation of that process. The local VCE Extension Agent or Unit Coordinator must submit all application forms. A minimum of six scholarships will be awarded. Each scholarship carries a stipend of \$100.00.

The notion that an individual with the greatest number of service hours automatically wins the prize, i.e., the scholarship, is NOT true. In fact, the Committee will be seeking those individuals who show initiative, have taken a leadership role within the Unit, and can demonstrate the potential to continue in a leadership position. More succinctly, is the nominee a role model for the Unit?

The Committee recognizes that significant differences exist in our Units relative to size and programmatic considerations. Usually this is due to the needs of the area being served. Rest assured that the Committee has decided that this will not be a delimiting factor as they review the application forms.
