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#### **Master Gardener Units Activities**

#### **GS and FC Master Gardeners prepare for 2013**

The *Ready, Set, Grow!* project has already begun with planning and preparation on the part of many dedicated individuals. Master Gardeners in the Green Spring and Fairfax County units work collaboratively with George Mason University's New Century College to provide programs to new students.

In 2012, volunteers conducted over p 100 two-hour presentations in 29 schools throughout Fairfax County. The excitement and the demand from over 2,300 children will propel the project into the new year with enthusiasm. Working with children stimulates creativity and generates an overall

sense of enthusiasm in adult volunteers. This gardening program affords MGs with a change of pace from working with adults. The opportunity to work with university students is the "...direct result of personal networking, a friend helping a friend, and then following up on an unexpected opportunity," says Stephanie Roesner, chair of the project. MGs teamed with under-

graduate and graduate students in this experiential learning program. They gained horticultural experience as well as time to plan and deliver programs that excite and engage children as they interact with plants.



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#### The Graine Thumb-George Graine, Fairfax County Master Gardeners Bulb Forcing: Beyond Paper white Narcissus



Before it is time to shovel the walk, scrape the ice off your car or remove the snow load from your conifers, did you ever think you could get an early start on spring by reading a new book? <u>Bulb Forcing for Beginners and the Seriously</u> <u>Smitten by Art Wolk (AAB Book Publishing, 2012)</u> is a suggested must read. Near the end of this book is a chapter on container gardening using only bulbs. The process is fully illustrated with color photos and easy-to-follow instructions. One might think of this as cheating nature in a colorful way. By selecting early-mid-late season bulbs, your garden "plot" can mimic a glorious spring garden in a small space for about six weeks. By starting other pots weeks apart, with a different bulb selection, you can have an indoor garden for months.

Wolk turns the bulb-forcing world in some new directions as he explores and explodes some oldthink "sage" advice. His more than 30 years of experience, including admission of trial and error, has brought a new level of understanding to the process of forcing bulbs with an educational, practical and humorous style of writing. This is the book if you want to learn how to become successful at forcing many different bulb types. You will probably agree with the author when he wrote "Forcing bulbs is a mode of mood elevation that's so easy you'll 'get it' before you get to the end of this book." He's right!

There are numerous books on how to force bulbs; however, Wolk's text has information that probably does not exist elsewhere or surely not in a single source. Now that his "secrets" are out, he provides more than adequate instructions (read guidance) for forcing five bulb types. All are given fair treatment including true bulbs (e.g., daffodils), corms (e.g., crocus), tubers (e.g., anemone), tuberous roots (e.g., dahlia) and rhizomes (e.g., calla lily). This is why the sub-title of this article, Beyond Paper white Narcissus, is appropriate.

Wolk has an enlightened and hilarious way, including some embarrassing situations, of dispelling bulb forcing fiction and even some ridiculous procedures. You may be surprised and think he is breaking the "rules" of bulb forcing. As noted earlier; however, his years of experimentation and experience top the know-it-all experts of other bulb forcing books and bulletins on the subject. A real example: If you tried your hand at forcing a hyacinth bulb hydroponically in an hourglass container did you have a successful venture? If not, then most likely you were not sufficiently informed about the do and do not of what is probably the simplest of all bulb-forcing methods. (Shameless truth – Grainethumb had a lousy experience and now he knows what he did incorrectly.)

To the casual reader, Wolk's bulb forcing book may look like just another large format coffee table book. Not true! The DIY explanations, diagrams and more than 350 magnificent color photos will help you pursue an indoor garden experience that may eventually lead to an expanded horticultural hobby. What you will also learn from his masterly photo-written dialogue is that you can force bulbs that you never considered possible to force; therefore, may the force be with you.


