Hanover County Master Gardeners

The Hanover Master Gardener Association (HMGA) was formed in 1988 to partner with and provide support for the local VCE office, funding for the EMG program and staffing for its projects. As the Hanover Master Gardener program developed, the early board members of the HMGA realized the importance of a local as well as state association and worked together with other VA Master Gardener units to help start the Virginia Master Gardener Association (VMGA). The first VMGA meeting was held in Hanover 30 years ago, in 1990. Many of our Hanover Master Gardeners have

held office and board positions in the VMGA. Our Association values our partnership with VMGA and looks forward to the next 30 years.

Currently, there are eighty three active Master Gardeners, eleven trainees, eight interns and one emeritus volunteer, working with the VCE ANR Agent Laura Maxey-Nay and Volunteer Coordinator Angelette Pryor. This year alone, EMG volunteers, trainees and interns volunteered 7,393 volunteer hours, received 1,717 continuing education hours and drove 39,729 miles to serve the community.

Since 1988, the Hanover Master Gardener Program has trained hundreds of VCE volunteers by offering training classes during day and evening hours. Hanover Master Gardeners are well known throughout the Richmond area as dedicated volunteers who are committed to building local area opportunities for public education. Our unit annually coordinates MG units from across the commonwealth to staff the VA Cooperative Extension booth at the State Fair.

Hanover Master Gardeners (HMGs) can be seen throughout the county staging plant clinics staffed by a minimum of four MGs and interns. In 2019, HMGs conducted 36 plant clinics and reported 4930 contacts. These HMGs are easy to identify as each of the plant clinic kits includes four "uniform" Hanover MG aprons to wear. HMGs have made a variety of tabletop demonstrations that are part of a theme for each plant clinic. These mini demos include composting systems, hoop houses, intensive/square foot gardening, cold frames and native bee houses. HMGs hold a large spring plant sale every year, the organization's signature event, to fund our Education Grant Program. This program allows organizations within the community to apply for funding for a gardening or environmental project to further public education. Since 2012 HMGA has awarded \$10,496 to 23 recipients—a

church, schools, county and state agencies. These groups have installed or revamped reading and butterfly gardens, as well as installed community gardens and gardening boxes.

Over the past three decades, Hanover Master Gardeners have developed special relationships with community partners such as Maymont, Lewis Ginter Botanical Garden and the State Fair of Virginia. HMGs support educational booths at these locations during regional educational events.

Spotted Lantern Fly (SLF)



The quarantine and spread of this invasive insect from China was discussed in detail by ANR Agent Mark Sutphin of Frederick County. Mark also serves Clarke, Page, Shenandoah, and Warren Counties and Extension Master Gardener volunteers in the Northern Shenandoah Valley. First detected in January of 2018 in the city of Winchester and Frederick County, VA, officials are working hard to learn more about the lifecycle, feeding habits, the destruction it causes to agriculture, viticulture and horticulture industries, and effective measures to control the SLF. Mark gave an hour long, advanced education presentation to VMGA Board Meeting attendees at the Northern Virginia 4H Center in Front Royal, VA on December 14, 2019. The SLF is an invasive pest to not only farmers and commercial growers, but to homeowners as well. Picture yourself and your family seated beneath a shady tree attempting to enjoy a picnic and a cool breeze. Instead, you could find yourself becoming bathed in a multitude of droplets of honeydew, if your tree is infested with SLF. Parked cars, children's toys, garden furniture all become covered in a sticky residue, making a once enjoyable setting a very unpleasant place to be. Education of EMGs and the general public is just one of the pieces in a puzzle of many. You can learn more online through local and regional authorities such as:




CURIOUS ABOUT PLANTS George Graine, Fairfax


Many books extol the virtues of landscape design as a form of art; however, it is unusual to find a book that discusses gardening from a scientific perspective. Can the two be combined? Of course they can! Dr. Lee Reich, a horticulturist and scientist has ably melded gardens with science in his new book "The Ever Curious Gardener: Using a Little Natural Science for a Much Better Garden" (New Society Publishers, 2018).

Please do not get turned off by the word "science" in the title. After all, every time you purchase a bag of fertilizer you will see three numbers on the bag that indicate the chemicals nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium. Some fertilizers may also indicate other chemicals that are nutrients known to





Reich's book is "not a comprehensive overview of botany and related sciences, just the natural science that can be applied in the garden." Furthermore, you can randomly browse other chapters that most interest you. Each chapter stands by itself and provides the rationale for what is



happening in your garden. With minimal effort and know-how you can have a decent garden.

After reading this book you will become a better gardener because you will have an increased understanding of why your garden looks better.

Combining scientific knowledge with your previous knowledge of gardening will definitely improve your gardening experience. Once you have a better scientific understanding of your garden, you will also become a better observer of each plant whether it is a flower, shrub, vegetable and more.

Each chapter begins with a few opening remarks that set the stage for an interesting discussion. The author's words are like a conversation with you, the reader. Reich makes gardening interesting as he explains what lies beneath your feet and how the sun interacts with plants. Note that in addition to being an informed read, this book also has its humorous side as well.

Below are Reich's introductions to each chapter in the book. Throughout each chapter is a symbol of a magnifying glass that provides more insights germane to the chapter.

- Chapter 1 Propagation and Planting: A lot of deception helps me get some seeds to sprout that under natural conditions would wisely stay asleep.
- Chapter 2 Soil: In which we watch the progress of water traveling through soil, with methods to, at the same time, speed it up and slow it down.
- Chapter 3 Flowering and Fruiting: Sex is introduced and its sometime importance is emphasized.
- Chapter 4 Stems and Leaves: In which my thumbnails, pruning shears, and branch bending coax plants into bushiness, lankiness, or anything betwixt.
- Chapter 5 Organization: Wherein families migrate together around my garden and for good reason.
- Chapter 6 Stress: On steps, human and otherwise, to avoid the havoc of icy cells during frigid temperatures.
- Chapter 7 Senses: In which I elucidate, abet, and alter the color of leaves, vegetables, and flowers.

In summary, after reading this book you will develop a better understanding of the science behind success with your plants. Dr. Reich writes in a pragmatic way. Throughout the book he dispels some gardening myths although not necessarily referring to them as such. You will be amused by his personal experience and how he reduces them to humorous explanations. In other words, be curious – it is good for your plants.
